Separation Anxiety

Often, the first thing that someone asks when viewing our pets, the dogs in particular, is where did they come from and how did we get them? Most often the circumstances which led them to us were divorce, moving, the death of the owner, financial difficulties or in extreme cases, pets seized by the state authorities.

The financial times of today are difficult for many pet owners. The cost of pet food has skyrocketed never mind the veterinary costs; add an expensive life saving medication to that and you are forced into making choices. Pets in some instances have become the largest expense in our everyday budget. If you are a multiple pet family, these can be hard times.

The heartache of facing the fact that we can no longer afford to keep our pets in the manner to which they've become accustomed is devastating. It's one thing to give up movies and going out to dinner but when pet costs soar, responsible pet owners don't have the luxury of not keeping up with anti-seizure medication or skin problem supplements. This is a dilemma.

We've all said "How could someone give up this dog?" not really knowing the heartache on the other side. And yes of course on some sides, there are no heartaches attached, which no self respecting animal lover could ever fathom. On the whole, separation anxiety - Ours - is great. Imagine giving up your pets because you simply can't afford them any longer or where you're moving to doesn't allow them. We've said "No way". We're seeing "Way".

The Little Guild has rescued many of these dogs and cats and we've become, in some instances, the only 'true home' to our worst luck cases and simply 'another' home to those whose owners have fallen on hard times. And those of you who have adopted pets from the The Little Guild have done the all important job of giving them their forever home.

Some years seem to hit everyone hard in the emotional realm of life. This year feels like one of them. Let's focus on having The Little Guild be there for these heartbreaking decisions and the positives for those kind people adopting. Our thanks to all of you who help us do this.

PIETER LEFFERTS, GENEROUS DONOR

Artist donates 30% of sales to The Little Guild

Pieter Lefferts is not only a renowned artist and musician but is also a **generous benefactor**. **Pieter is donating 30% of all proceeds** from the sale of his pastels being shown at the **John Harney Associates office located at 7 Academy Street in Salisbury, CT**. The exhibition and sale is on view until the end of March, 2010 and we urge everyone to go and see it and, hopefully, make a purchase which benefits the organisation that you all so generously support as well as recognises the generosity of Pieter to The Little Guild.

Pieter Lefferts' work is a reflection of his inner self (as is his music) be it a painting in moonlight at his camp in a remote part of the Adirondacks, a painting of his guitar and slide (a signed Gibson Les Paul using a pick given to him by B.B.King) or a painting of a local scene in the Northwest corner. As Pieter says "music and art share the same vocabulary, that of colour and that is why my music reflects my art and my art my music. For me one does not exist without the other."

Pieter works in oil, acrylics and pastels and takes commissions as well as teaches art. Most important, however, is that all of his work, painting as well as music, reflect his sensitivity to his subject, his feelings and to his environment. This is reflected most strongly in his paintings made at his camp in the Adirondacks which can be reached only after rowing across two lakes with a mile portage between lakes!

Pieter is indeed a man of many talents, having served as the road manager for the Gerry Mulligan Quartet, the late great baritone sax player and having toured the world with him. It was at one of these concerts that he met B.B. King who gave him his pick that he cherishes and which is shown with his guitar in the pastel which is on show at the Harney Gallery in Salisbury.

The animals at The Little Guild thank Pieter for his thoughtfulness and appreciate that he is providing them an opportunity for them to move on to better and permanent homes with his donation.
